Our new Headteacher

Following Mr Foord's announcement that he is to retire this summer, School Governors have lost no time in searching and finding a top quality candidate to fulfil the role from this September. After a national advert and an extremely rigorous interview process over two days, the governors have made their decision with advice and support from the Local Authority and Kingfisher Learning Trust.

Our Chair of Governors, Jane Bates announced the news: "The successful candidate is Suzanne Pass who will be moving from her role as a Director for Kingfisher Learning Trust. Suzanne has been a school governor since last September and in her statement for that role she explains that she has worked within special education for the last twenty years. She has been an Assistant Headteacher and led whole school development over many years, particularly in the areas of curriculum and assessment and has led the establishment of the collaboration of special schools across neighbouring authorities. She has a particular interest in Communication, Inclusion and enrichment opportunities. Mrs Pass will communicate directly shortly and properly introduce herself. She will hopefully get the opportunity to visit school and prepare for the transition before the summer."

All pupils have worked incredibly hard over the past 3-6 months taking part in various activities which include: football/cycling (physical section), accessing gardening tools (skill section) and helping to tidy up and set out equipment for forest school lessons in the afternoon for other classes to access (volunteering).

They have demonstrated fantastic resilience to continue to attend each activity and done themselves and the school proud!

The DofE pupils will now be challenged to complete the final section; which is the expedition section during summer term at the 'Longdendale Trail'.





Pupils in 6A have worked very hard so far since September for their RSPB awards! In the autumn term, 6A successfully completed their Bronze Award. The wild challenge is a challenge for you to connect with the natural world in brave new ways and earn awards as you go. The pupils completed 6 challenges set by the RSPB, 3 helping nature and 3 experiencing nature. The pupils enjoyed travelling around Linnet getting a closer look to bugs and insects, making homes for mammals, sensing the world and many more experiences.

In the spring term, the pupils have achieved their Silver Challenge Award. Challenges have included: Wildlife detecting, Habitat Heaps, Big Schools Birdwatch, and fundraising plus many more at Linnet Clough. As part of social life this term, the topic has been fundraising/helping in my community, where the pupils have become RSPB pin badge holders, and have been out and about selling pin badges- raising a total £51.40 for the RSPB.





17 of our Sixth Form students have commenced some work experience opportunities in both internal and external settings this term. These placements are designed to prepare the young adults for greater independence in adult life, as well as employment or further training. This has proved to be a great success and will continue next academic year. Well done to the students who took part!

PRE-SUPPORTED INTERNSHIP

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In preparation for adulthood, two of our students, Jack and James, in our Sixth Form attended a Pre-supported Internship Programme through Active, which took place over a four week period. This involved half a day at Tameside College and half a day in a working environment. Jack and James should be very proud of themselves!





EXPLORING THE OUTSIDE WORLD

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6A have been visiting the Trafford Centre as part of their Home Life -Shopping for Myself topic. The pupils visited a variety of contrasting shops where they experienced the different sights, sounds and participated in buying items. The pupils enjoyed visiting the food court as part of their Professional Life 'Fast topic, where they chose their own lunch and even participated using the self service machines. On their last visit, the pupils completed a self-evaluation of each shop using their communication method to say if they liked or disliked the shops. We had clear answers showing who enjoys shopping and who really isn't a fan!

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Studying 'Physical World', AA1 went to Pets at Home in Ashton-Under-Lyne to look at different animals and what they need. They explored the different textures and sounds the items made as well as watching a variety of animals such as rabbits, guinea pigs and fish.





3D have been working with the Peoplescape Theatre group in collaboration with the Portland Basin Museum. The theatre group came into school doing workshops with the children for 3 weeks then presented their work in a final performance at the museum on Tuesday 21st March. The play was set in 1923 and performed on the 1920's street, where some of the exhibits were used to create a lifelike experience for the children. The performance was very interactive and the children were involved from start to finish. Esme made us laugh being a very strict teacher and teacher, Christine had to wear the dunces cap! The children shouted 'That's not fair!' at the mill owner who paid the men more than the women and Riley worked out that Bertie had saved his farthings to help Auntie Stella get grandad's watch out of the pawn shop. The performance ended with all the children and the actors dancing the Charleston to celebrate. They all joined in and were great at knee swinging as we had practised this in the workshops!





AA1 had an amazing time at Blackpool Zoo on Monday 27th March. They enjoyed seeing all types of animals, including elephants, giraffes, otters, sealions, primates and even dinosaurs!

OTHER IMPORTANT NEWS

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ACADEMISATION UPDATE

Thank you to those parents who attended, or sent questions to, our Parents' Briefing on Academisation and met, listened to and questioned the leaders of the Kingfisher Learning Trust. Staff also had a briefing on the same day.

The main news is:

- The Department for Education has approved the academisation in principle which means that we can begin the process of getting the organisation needed for academisation prepared.
- Kingfisher will visit school on the 4th May to better understand how we work for the highest standards of Teaching and Learning and Curriculum for our pupils.
- The academisation isn't confirmed until school governors sign it off just prior to the change over.

Questions and answers:

- Q- How does the academy affect transport provided by the local authority?
- A- There is no change to transport arrangements as these are independent of school
- Q- Is Kingfisher Learning Trust a charity or business?
- A- All academies are technically 'exempt charities'.
- Q-Will the local authority have any say after academisation?
- A- The Local Authority (or the child's Local Authority) remain responsible for all the EHCPs of all the pupils in school. They retain control of who attends our school and it is their job to work with parents to satisfy themselves that the provision and outcomes of each EHCP are being met.
